Central Regional TAFE (CRTAFE) spans an area across four regions and multiple Communities and Language groups. In fact, the area is around 57% of Western Australia!

Making a 'sea change' provides the option of studying on campus, online or at your own pace with minimal classroom attendance.

There are nine campuses, each offering a broad range of Vocational Education and Training (VET), with focus on local industry and market needs.

With 81% of agricultural, forestry and fishing, 33% of health and 31% of construction jobs in regional Australia^ it makes sense to study where the work is and connect with local industry and employers.

A significant benefit of CRTAFE is that we engage regularly with the local business community to better understand what skills are needed and emerging, working with them for placements for Trainees and Apprentices.

Whether you're planning to work or study, regional WA offers loads of reasons to venture out of the suburbs to fresh air and a relaxed lifestyle.

From the beauty of the Wheatbelt, to the splendour of the Goldfields, up to the blue oceans and red desert of the Gascoyne and Midwest, the regions offer so much more.

THE WHEATBELT

The Wheatbelt is home to three CRTAFE campuses: Northam, Moora and Merredin. Located in the stunning Avon Valley, the Wheatbelt region is brimming with lifestyle and fresh air.

Northam Campus

Situated near the Avon River and just 96km from Perth, Northam is receiving significant upgrades in 2022 to trade facilities. Offering a broad range of courses, Northam campus is well-regarded for delivery in Local Government qualifications and Rangers training, amongst many other offerings.

THE MIDWEST & GASCOYNE

The Midwest region covers nearly one-fifth of Western Australia's land area, spanning around 478,000 square kilometres from Green Head to Kalbarri and more than 800km inland to Wiluna in the Gibson Desert.

The region is divided into three subregions that demonstrate similarities in environment, land use, demography and industry. These are the Batavia Coast, Murchison and North Midlands subregions.

The Central Regional TAFE Midwest campuses boast some of the State's best training facilities, producing award winning trainees and apprentices at National level.

Geraldton Campus

With state-of-the-art facilities in health, nursing, trades and many local industry training needs, the Geraldton campus is a bustling hub near the centre of town.

The Fitzgerald Street campus offers training in industry-simulated learning environments in the areas of health, education, community services, construction, building, rural industries, mining, metals, art, automotive, hospitality, business, management, information technology and more.

Batavia Coast Maritime Institute (BCMI)

The BCMI is renowned globally for its marine research and breeding facility. The campus offers nationally recognised qualifications from Certificate I up to Diploma level in aquaculture, laboratory science, conservation & ecosystem management, marine and environmental science, as well as maritime qualifications.

Five great campuses. Head north to study and work and enjoy a great lifestyle while training in areas that provide great work opportunities.

Technology Park Campus

Just 12km from the centre of Geraldton, Technology Park hosts a variety of courses with industrial and heavy duty capabilities for servicing and training. The complex is purpose built to deliver training for trainees, apprentices, post trade, technicians and plant operators in construction, operation and maintenance of resource sector facilities, plant and equipment.

Carnarvon Campus

Gateway to the Shark Bay world heritage area, the campus delivers around 40 qualifications to 600 students each year. Renowned for banana plantations and its natural landscapes, Carnarvon lies at the mouth of the Gascoyne River on the Indian Ocean.

Training covers art, hospitality, business, finance, information technology, conservation and ecosystem management, community services and general education.

Exmouth Campus

Established in 1997, around 25 qualifications are delivered to 250 students each year.

842km north of Geraldton, Exmouth is at the tip of WA's North West Cape on the doorstep of world heritage listed Ningaloo Reef.



AWARD WINNER

Maryke Gray, Lecturer Conservation and Land Management (CALM), was awarded the 2021 WA Lecturer of the Year Award.

Recognising the need for specialised fauna handling training in regional WA, she developed College capacity at the Geraldton BCMI campus.

Innovation was realised through simple staff empowerment, enabling incorporation of this important aspect of CALM training into programs, resulting in the College being the only RTO in WA delivering the program.

Maryke's community and industry collaboration with the Yamatji Marlpa Aboriginal Corporation resulted in the training and assessment of the Malgana Indigenous Ranger Program in the Shark Bay and Denham areas.

Additionally, Geraldton, Kalgoorlie and Northam have Jobs & Skills Centres on campus, as well as a sub-centre office in Carnarvon.



University Pathways

A Diploma qualification enables enrolment in a University Degree, regardless of age or high school results.

With articulation arrangements in place with leading Universities in Australia, including Curtin University and Geraldton Universities Centre, students who have achieved their Diploma qualification can gain guaranteed credits into a related Bachelor's Degree at select Universities.

Having a Central Regional TAFE Diploma and a University Degree equips you with the best of both worlds for future employment opportunities.

Still at school?

Vocational Education & Training Delivered to Secondary Students

Years 11 and 12 students can complete a nationally recognised qualification.

Gain a better understanding of a specific career pathway, and increase your opportunities for further study or work.

Pre-Apprenticeships in Schools (PAiS)

A school-based traineeship or apprenticeship provides an opportunity for full-time secondary school students to begin preparing themselves for a career in the workforce.

Students work towards secondary graduation and an industry-recognised qualification.

Earn while you learn

Pre-Apprenticeship

Certificate II trade qualifications are also often referred to as pre-apprenticeships. Generally there are no entry requirements or experience needed to enrol.

Apprenticeship or Traineeship Programs

Apprenticeships and traineeships combine study with workplace training.

You must be employed as an apprentice or a trainee before enrolling in these programs.

Choose your qualification.



Short Courses

Courses which help you start higher education and prepare for work, with confidence. Can help advance existing skills or learn something completely new. Generally non-accredited, taking minimal hours to complete.

Skill Sets

NATIONALLY ACCREDITED CERTIFICATION

Also considered short courses, they provide certification (nationally accredited) for a specific workplace skill and usually contain one or more units of competency. On completion, receive a statement of attainment. In some cases, this may give credit towards completing a higher qualification with further study.

Certificate I & II

Entry level qualifications to develop basic skills and knowledge and prepare for employment and further education and training.

Certificate III

OFTEN PART OF APPRENTICESHIP OR TRAINEESHIP

Gain broad theoretical and practical knowledge in your chosen industry, preparing you to take on added responsibility. A Certificate III teaches job-specific skills. The qualification is designed to help you progress from an entry-level role and get started on your career journey.


Certificate IV*

Learn supervisory and advanced technical skills which may build on skills already acquired in the workplace or obtained in a Certificate III.

Diploma & Advanced Diploma*

* PATHWAYS TO HIGHER LEVEL QUALIFICATIONS OR UNIVERSITY

Higher level qualifications provide more specialised skills and knowledge of greater complexity. Learn to appraise, synthesise, manage and evaluate workplace situations. Graduates gain the ability to undertake highly skilled work. Both qualifications can also give you credit towards a Bachelor Degree.





THERE'S NEVER BEEN A BETTER TIME TO JUMP INTO TRAINING

This State Government initiative provides a range of free skill sets and half price qualifications. These will continue until 2025.

Whether you're looking for a job, thinking about a career change, or up-skilling for your own development, now's the time to get skills ready.

FREE COURSES



Working closely with WA industries, businesses and employers, we've found the types of skills needed right now and for future jobs.

Free training courses come in two categories:

Free Job Ready Skill Sets

Some are free for everyone and others are free for eligible students (with a fee-paying option for those who don't meet the free eligibility).

Free skill sets are made up of units of competency from nationally recognised VET qualifications, you will receive credit for them if you choose to go on to further study. Some are also available for blended or online study.

Free Infection Control Skill Sets:

Free for everyone and offered mostly online.

They skill you in the safe management of infection control in the workplace, applicable across various industries.

HALF-PRICE COURSES



As part of the State Government's Lower Fees, Local Skills (LFLS) initiative you can get a nationally recognised and accredited qualification but pay only half the fees. Sometimes the total fee is even less than half price.

There are also fee caps of \$400 for 15-24 year olds or eligible concession students (\$1,200 for non-concession students).

There is a large range of qualifications available, with more being added, all carefully matched with the skills employers are looking for, so you'll be job ready.

TUITION AND RESOURCE FEES

Fees vary for each course and are broken up into two parts: Tuition Fees and Resource Fees.

If you have an eligible and valid concession card, the tuition fees are charged at a reduced rate.

No fees apply for Vocational Education and Training Delivered to Secondary Students (VETDSS).

Tuition fees: Based on the number of hours within each unit of the course.

Resource fees: Costs associated with materials required for the course.

COURSE FEE REPAYMENT OPTIONS

To make training accessible, payment options are available to assist meeting repayment obligations.

Study options.

NOT ALL TRAINING IS IN THE CLASSROOM!

Choose your study options, also called *delivery modes*, depending on how much time you have to give to training, your personal situation and ability to come onto campus.

Face-to-face (F2F) - full or part-time

Flexible Delivery (FD) / Online Learning (OL) (self-paced)

Blended Delivery (BD)

Intensive Blocks (IB)

Apprenticeship & Traineeship (A) & (T)

Pre-Apprenticeship

VETDSS or PAIS (see page 16)

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)

FACE-TO-FACE On campus study is known as *face-to-face* (F2F) delivery. Classes may be scheduled during the day or evenings. Some but not all courses are offered part-time.

Note: you do not have to pay for your entire course upfront. There are pay as you go options.

FLEXIBLE DELIVERY (SELF-PACED) *Flexible delivery (FD)* allows study at your own pace with access to a lecturer; beneficial for those wanting to combine work and study.

Note: Flexible delivery may include campus class time, online learning and duration and assessment deadlines.

ONLINE LEARNING *Online (OL)* training options are also *self-paced*, using some of the most innovative online tools available. Students have access to a lecturer and may include virtual classrooms (VC). Some courses may require some campus class time for practical components or assessment.

BLENDED DELIVERY (BD) A mixture of online study and on-campus class times.

INTENSIVE BLOCKS (IB) Gain a qualification in a reduced time frame, with minimal class time, known as *intensive blocks* (IB). Course work, assignments and projects are completed in your own time.

APPRENTICESHIPS / TRAINEESHIPS

An apprenticeship (A) is a full time employment-based training program lasting 3-4 years. It combines on-the-job learning and scheduled training with a Registered Training Provider (RTO).

A Traineeship is a full-time employment-based training program usually lasting 12 months or more.

PRE-APPRENTICESHIPS These don't require an employment contract. They're a good way of gaining an advantage in securing an apprenticeship position. RPL-Assessment range of evidence also includes questionnaires and observations.

RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING

RPL is a form of assessment acknowledging formal and informal learning gained through:

Previous training and education

Past and current work experience

Life experience

The RPL process involves validation of existing skills and knowledge, allowing you to obtain credits in a course and, in some cases, a full qualification.

The RPL-Assessment range of evidence includes questionnaires and observations. Assessment uses a range of evidence such as existing academic records, proof of training course/workshop attendance, written support by previous employers and by viewing procedures and processes undertaken in your workplace.

Contact CRTAFE for further information. An assessor will explain what you need to provide in order to evidence your skills and knowledge.

This is a great way to save time and money while working toward the skills and training you want!

Next steps.

THERE ARE A FEW THINGS YOU NEED BEFORE ENROLLING.

Although many courses do have minimum entry requirements, there are many ways to gain entry into your chosen course. The Client Services team can help explain your options.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

Each course has minimum entry requirements. These are either a lower level qualification or demonstrated numeracy and literacy skill levels.

Please review individual course requirements, as they do vary.

UNIQUE STUDENT IDENTIFIER (USI)

The Australian Government requires all students enrolling or re-enrolling in nationally recognised training to register for a USI.

This identifier is made up of numbers and letters allowing your USI account to be linked with the National VET Data Collection, enabling you to see all your training results (from 2015) from all providers, including completed training units and qualifications.

The USI is available online and at no cost via:

usi.gov.au/students/get-a-usi

Note: this is a different number to the Student Identification Number issued by CRTAFE.

TAFE ADMISSIONS

Some popular full-time courses require application for a place ahead of time due to limited availability. Applications open a couple of months prior to the semester.

Application opening and closing dates can be found on the course page, with intakes in Semester 1, 2 or both.


Some courses may require a pre-application. Check the CRTAFE course web-page well in advance of applications opening.



Web course pages have information on how to enrol in that course at your preferred location.

ROLLING ENROLMENTS

Many CRTAFE campuses offer courses open for enrolments all year. These are mainly for flexible or online courses, and some full-time courses.



There are four steps for new students; three for students who have previously enrolled. On the website, you will notice the course is either available or not available.

The first time you enrol requires you to provide information and documents so we can verify who you are, your right to study in Australia and the checking of any concessions to which you may be entitled.

Course taking expressions of interest

If the course you are interested in does not have an active 'Apply Now' button to the right of the course information, scroll down and send a Course Enquiry form to seek an expression of interest.



Course taking enrolments

1. Select the location and/or mode of delivery. *If the course is an online course, it doesn't matter which campus it's delivered from.*
2. If you are unsure if you meet the entry requirements, send a Course Enquiry form.
3. Check the delivery method you have selected is right for you; sometimes there is more than one listed.
4. Click 'Click here to Apply'



5. You will be taken to the registration portal. If you are a returning student, simply login.
6. New students must register to receive a Student Identification Number (SIN). **Important:** Record your SIN and password, you'll need them again.



7. Upload the following documents during the application process. Have these ready before starting the application, although once registered, you can return if you don't have the documents with you.



8. Fill out all the mandatory fields. Even if it's not mandatory, the more information you provide, the better, to help assess your suitability for the course.
9. Once completed and submitted, you'll either receive confirmation of enrolment or an offer. If not successful, you will be contacted to discuss other options.



Work, Health and Safety (also known as Occupational Health and Safety or OSH) is a key component of every workplace in Australia and will therefore hold significant financial rewards once qualified.

OSH or WHS Officers coordinate and implement health and safety processes within an organisation. They provide advice to management and employees on WHS related matters. Training topics include how to identify risks and hazards, how to communicate and document risk, procedures and processes, compliance with relevant laws, implementation of emergency procedures and how to identify appropriate actions for resolving WHS issues.

Communication, reliability, teamwork, patience, resilience and initiative are required for all jobs, and this will continue to be the case in the future. These skills are also highly valued by employers. A 2019 survey conducted by the National Skills Centre asked employers about the importance of these sorts of skills.

Some 75% of employers considered employability skills to be as important, if not more important, than technical skills.


In the year since the COVID-19 pandemic began, digital technology has become even more important to Australian businesses, workforce, and the economy.

When you study IT, you develop not only computing skills in a range of disciplines, but the problem solving skills to deal with new technologies and trends as they arise.





The Central Regional TAFE Batavia Coast Maritime Institute (BCMI) campus in Geraldton provides world-class training in aquaculture, fishing operations and maritime studies.

Qualifications can set you up for a career in a range of maritime-related fields, including commercial fishing, marine tourism, aquaculture, or a deck cadet or ship's captain.

Winning awards and breaking records is all in a days work at the BCMI. Staff and students at the BCMI are committed to their areas of expertise and go above and beyond to excel in their field.

In 2018, the team won an Australian Training Award for Industry Collaboration on the Abrolhos Islands Conservation Project.

In 2019, in an Australian first for marine ornamentals aquaculture, they successfully spawned and cultured a rare Australian coral reef fish species. The Rainfordia Opercularis, otherwise known as the Flathead Perch is highly sought after in the marine ornamentals industry, with a price tag of approximately \$US5,000 each.

Aquaculture

Aquaculture is the controlled process of cultivating aquatic organisms. In your studies you'll learn and develop practical skills and knowledge to care for and maintain fish stocks. Assist or manage the operations of fish farms, marine farms and hatcheries.

Fishing Operations



